

# Approach

## Purpose

Cassowary Coast Regional Council commissioned a MARKYT® Community Scorecard to:

- Assess performance against objectives and services in the Community Plan and Corporate Plan
- Benchmark performance
- Determine community priorities
- Seek community suggestions





## The Study

Cassowary Coast Regional Council commissioned CATALYSE® to conduct an independent MARKYT® Community Scorecard.

All community members were invited to take part. Scorecard invitations were sent to all households and residential PO Boxes in the Cassowary Coast Region using Australia Post unaddressed mail services. Respondents could complete the scorecard in hard copy or online.

CATALYSE® sent email invitations to Cassowary Coast Regional Council's customer contacts, and Council provided supporting promotions through various communication channels. The scorecard was open from 25 April to 13 May 2022.








The scorecard was completed by **1,859 community members** with various connections to the Council:









### Building and maintaining local roads

#### **Community Driven Actions**

- 1. Maintain **gravel roads** to a higher standard:
  - grade more regularly, especially after storms and heavy rain
  - repair potholes and edges
  - improve drainage
  - improve the quality and speed of maintenance and repair services
- 2. Bituminize and seal unsealed roads.
- 3. Ensure road maintenance is a **permanent solution** rather than a temporary fix.

#### A sample of community voices

"Improving public roads, potholes, unsealed roads, and bitumen distribution."

"Our roads are disgusting. We live in the wettest part of Australia, yet we still have dirt tracks."

"The condition of some roads is awful."

"Unsealed roads are in the worst state ever due to no regular maintenance."

"Sealing of dirt roads rather than being graded once a year if you are lucky."

"We need more of our roads sealed every year. Many of our local roads are in shocking condition."

"The traffic is ridiculous. We constantly live in dust, they patch it, and the dust gets worse. It desperately needs bitumen."

"Our access to our house is a dirt road, always full of potholes so huge that you could lose your car in them."

"There are always washouts during rain (especially on the highway). I have had to replace tires and get multiple wheel alignments due to BIG potholes in the roads."

"Increase maintenance of gravel roads."
Drainage and the gradual sealing of gravel roads."

"The roads are dangerous. Fix them right the first time instead of constantly refilling holes."

"Fix the main roads properly, not just patchwork that does not last."

"Proper, long-term repairs rather than spot jobs that barely last."



## Access to health and community services

#### **Community Driven Actions**

- Work with Federal and State Government to attract and retain health professionals in the Cassowary Coast Region, including:
  - GPs
  - Specialists
  - Mental health services
  - Dentists
  - Physiotherapists, optometrists and other allied health professionals
- 2. Advocate for improved access to **health services** including:
  - · more bulk billing medical facilities
  - more after hours medical services
  - shorter wait times for appointments
- 3. Advocate for improved access to health care in **Mission Beach**.

#### A sample of community voices

"Lobby Federal / State Government to encourage more GPs and specialists to our region."

"More funding from State and Federal Governments to provide adequate staffing of hospitals and aged care facilities in the region. Also attract more ancillary health services for adults and children (mental health, physiotherapy/rehabilitation/medical specialists visits)."

"Enticing more GPs and surgeons to the area and investing in more medical equipment."

"More needs to be done on a Government level and better rural incentives for doctors to stay in the area long term."

"We need more doctors in town so we're not waiting for 2 weeks ++ for an appointment. Incentives to keep doctors in town."

"Disgraceful! Mission Beach - population 4000 with not one doctor!"

"No medical doctor is available in Mission Beach. Terrible situation for our community."

"To only have one doctor's surgery is a disgrace. We have driven to Innisfail or Cairns when sick due to having to wait weeks for an appointment."

"Having no access to the relevant physio equipment at the hospital made it hard for me to recover from a serious injury."

"We need more bulk billing doctors/medical centres, as the current wait time for most doctors is 3+ weeks (that's if they even accept new patients."

"It would be great to see more Doctors or after-hour doctor services as there is none."



### Council's leadership

#### **Community Driven Actions**

- Increase transparency, accountability and integrity.
- 2. Improve community engagement:
  - Inform the community about what is happening
  - Involve the community in local decision making
  - Listen and represent local needs
- 3. Review the **organisational structure** the organisation is considered to be too top heavy by some community members.

#### A sample of community voices

"Be visible. Be accountable. Fulfil the role elected on. Know the community and its needs. Avoid the 'Ivory Tower' syndrome."

"Councillors need to understand and use cultural protocols. Need to all hold regular open meetings or be accessible during the day to discuss issues. Mayor needs to be more available to the public...Senior management does not appear to be able to see 'the big picture'."

"More transparency in council meetings and activities. This would eliminate incorrect reports/rumours circulating throughout the Shire."

"Leadership is very poor. No communications with local ratepayers until decisions are passed in secret, behind closed doors. Should be more consultation with the community BEFORE decisions are made."

"Stop being so secretive. More information."

"Emails take anything up to 6 weeks to be answered, if at all."

"A clear breakdown of where rate money goes."

"Senior management should be readily available to meet with residents to discuss their concerns and be responsible for return correspondence."

"Council to be less top-heavy with more workforce on the ground."

"Integrity, exemplary and transparency of Council Leadership are expected by tax rate payers. Trust needs to be built on a daily basis. Unfortunately, I read too many stories which discredit the action of the Cassowary Coast Council (false or true, hard to tell).

I really hope for a better image of our Council."

"Council needs to go back to open council meetings where anybody can ask and expect an answer during meetings."

"Be honest. Public to the meetings. No screening of questions."



### Economic development and job creation

#### **Community Driven Actions**

- Develop an economic development and investment attraction strategy to diversify the economy.
- 2. Provide improved **job prospects** for locals.
- Provide more apprenticeships and entry level positions for **young people** to retain local youth, and encourage those who leave for further study to return.
- 4. Provide **incentives** to attract and retain local businesses and new industries.
- Improve support for local businesses by providing greater economic assistance, lower costs, and removing red tape.
- 6. Activate tourism on **Dunk Island**.
- 7. Develop a plan to fill local shops and improve access to local goods and services so more people can **shop locally**, instead of travelling to and shopping in Cairns and Townsville.

#### A sample of community voices

"Council to offer incentives in conjunction with State and Federal Governments for new enterprises to set up in the Cassowary Coast area."

"Our young people are leaving this region in droves due to no incentive or job creation/growth. Planning for the future of this region should be actioned, especially job creation, business development and incentives for investment."

"So few trades available now in the local area. So few office jobs in town - difficult to reverse but a major reason for young people leaving. Incentives needed for local businesses to remain open and employable."

"More jobs/diversified industry (not just bananas and sugar)."

"Identify economic opportunities and support development opportunities.

Prioritise long-term investment. Most beautiful area in Australia is
lagging behind in tourism and development."

"Encouraging business growth and supporting applications for new business to town, rather than placing hurdles in front of them so they move away.

Supporting business to encourage job growth."

"Reduce 'red tape' and fees for new business/development in the area.

Work with new businesses in a more positive manner."

"Make it easier for developers and business owners, e.g. competitive development charges and associated licences, and make it easier for them to obtain required permits and licences."

"Survey residents on why they shop in Cairns and Townsville - ask what is missing. That drains \$\$ out of town. Business incubator for start ups. Make CCRC Businesses digitally capable. Access to motivational workshops. Small Business Awards."



### Seniors' care, services and facilities

#### **Community Driven Actions**

- Advocate for more retirement villages, aged care accommodation, and respite.
- Advocate for more in-home care and assisted living services to enable older residents to remain at home.
- Advocate for improved access to local health services.
- Advocate for a seniors' bus service and other public transport options for seniors.
- Improve access for people with disability and mobility issues - ramps, rails, parking spaces, public toilets, etc.
- 6. Attract more **volunteers** to support the elderly.
- Retain and improve non-digital communications to reach seniors.

#### A sample of community voices

"More senior housing is needed to ensure elderly people can have independent living."

"Retirement village (with care options). Lifestyle village for over 50's, 2-3 bedroom houses for individuals, not apartment blocks."

"With an ageing population, more help needs to be made available to enable people to stay in their homes."

"When older people are still living in their own houses, they need a bit of extra care.

It is very difficult for the family to get any help."

"Re-instate a Medical Centre and Pathology Service back in Mission Beach.

Set up an Aged Care/Disability Respite Centre in Mission Beach,
there are a lot of older retirees moving into the area."

"More help for seniors to get around. At the moment, getting buses to visit required appointments in Innisfail, Cairns etc. is very difficult."

"This is an aging population. Senior services, entertainment, community support and public transport would assist the elderly in town to remain independent."

"For an aged female I cannot find anyone willing to give a hand to assist in many activities that I am finding very daunting, eg. cutting the seed pods from foxtail palms, digging with a pick, trimming trees etc. There doesn't seem to be too many volunteers.

I have found a young lad who mows my grass and I am willing to pay."

"Don't rely on electronic media to inform the public. A lot of people, especially the elderly, do not use Facebook, Twitter etc."

"Being mindful that most elderly & blind cannot use online communications and keeping methods available to communicate with them with Council updates."



## Community safety and crime prevention

#### **Community Driven Actions**

- Seek greater police visibility with more patrols, especially at night, to address issues of youth crime, vandalism, burglaries, car theft, hooning and drug and alcohol abuse.
- 2. Install more **CCTV** cameras and lighting in well known hot spots.
- 3. Promote and facilitate a community program like **Neighbourhood Watch.**
- Advocate for harsher punishments for repeat offenders.

#### A sample of community voices

"Get more police in our towns. 90% of the times I've called police for assistance, they've had to send someone from Innisfail, so it's one hour or more before help arrives."

"There is way too much juvenile crime in this region. We need more police out and about in this area."

"More of a noticeable police presence. On foot patrol around town, the Esplanade area, and parks due to anti-social behaviour and littering."

"Police station to be manned 24 /7."

"Lobby for funding assistance to erect more camera surveillance in car parks, community buildings and toilets for improved street safety and personal security when shopping or using venues and town businesses."

"Need more CCTV cameras in known streets of crime and tougher punishments."

"There needs to be more street lighting and increased video surveillance."

"For safety reasons, we need more lighting in the streets."

"Patrol suburbs. Form Neighbourhood Watch in all suburbs."

"Need to introduce Neighbourhood Watch rosters as youth and crime has increased."

"Neighbourhood watch - issue more security cameras. Remove derelicts out of all parks. More drug and crime prevention teams."

"Youth crime is over the fence. Break-ins are everywhere, even in retirement villages.

No one is safe in their own home. Punishment for these crimes is too soft.

Police have their hands tied, we need stronger penalties."



### Youth services and facilities

#### **Community Driven Actions**

- Provide a greater range of free and low cost sporting and recreational activities for youth, such as:
  - Sporting activities: BMX and pump track, motorbike tracks, skate park, basketball courts, beach volleyball courts, unlock tennis courts when not being used by clubs, etc.
  - Recreational activities: events, music festivals, competitions, entertainment facilities, games room, pool hall, groovy café, PCYC discos, movie cinema, cooking classes, wood work classes, graffiti art, a water theme park, water slides into the river, wave park, adventure park, zip-lining, trampoline centre, skating rink, rock climbing, ten-pin bowling, a gym, fishing pontoons, etc.
- 2. Provide more **after school and holiday** programs and activities.
- 3. Advocate for a new youth and drop-in centre.
- Advocate for improved access to mental health services and facilities for youth.
- Appoint a Youth Services Officer to develop programs and incentives to engage youth in existing activities.

#### A sample of community voices

"Invest in finances for the development of youth programs in Tully.

There are very few facilities for youth that do not play sport."

"There needs to be something interesting and exciting for young people, e.g. a zip line course, adventure park, a wave park etc. It is a no-brainer!"

"Let's face it, the local youth of today here in Innisfail cannot wait to be old enough to leave the town. There seems to be nothing for them to do here, particularly on the weekends, as there is no public transport and nothing happening in the town."

"We need to have something happening (more than just a skate park) happening most weekends. It may be a contemporary music event or maybe a movie being shown somewhere. (The council offices have a decent movie theatre, don't they?) Or even a decent drop-in centre being available for after-hours use."

"It would be great to develop more services across the whole region for young people, giving them activities they can access for free or for a little charge. The only thing to consider is how to get young people to these events when their parents work. It would be great if these could give young people skills (e.g. cooking, word work, handiwork etc.) to support them in life."

"Can you provide training courses for teens, perhaps in conjunction with the high school? Learn to use hand tools, fix push bikes, dog training classes, grow vegetables, and learn about composting."

"A safe place for teenagers to go to socialise and hang out in Mission Beach."

"There needs to be a venue or PCYC within MB for wet school holidays where teens can interact safely with guidance to reduce youth disengagement within the community."

"Young people's mental health issues need better support."

"They need easy access to mental health services, many live remote and are isolated."



## Footpaths, trails and cycleways

#### **Community Driven Actions**

- Improve maintenance and safety of paths and cycleways – keep tidy, even, clear of overgrown trees and plants, and clean and free of mould so they are not slippery, especially after rainfall.
- Improve connectivity with a more extensive, better quality network of footpaths, trails and cycleways - especially for:
  - · children to get to and from school safely
  - children and adults to exercise and recreate to walk, run, ride bikes and scooters, etc.
  - encouraging people to walk or cycle instead of driving
- Ensure footpaths meet accessibility requirements for wheelchairs, prams etc.

#### A sample of community voices

"Improve connectivity of pathways and install pathways adjacent to all urban streets."

"I would love a footpath in my street."

"Cycling path to Alligators Creek and other sites."

"The proposed Etty Bay to Cocquette Point walk needs to be back on the CCRC spotlight."

"More paths for people to exercise safely off roads."

"A classic example is the path along South Mission Beach. Children ride their scooters on the road, not on the path."

"Please make at least one walking track that's well maintained for running and walking that's close to Innisfail. We have so many hills can we please walk up one. Like Cairns has Mt Whitfield, Atherton, Mt Baldy, Mission Beach has Bicton Hill. Innisfail only has a flat walking path around a river - hardly exciting or real exercise."

"The cleaning of the path along the foreshore needs to be done more often as it gets slippery and is very dangerous at times."

"Improve cycle paths and cycling safety."

"Additional cycleways would support the community using bicycles as a form of transport."

"More footpaths and cycleways to encourage people to get out and walk and be able to cycle to their destinations safely. Footpaths need to be wheelchair friendly."

"As a limited vision person, the footpaths in the area (including the CBD) are woeful and need repairs and upgrading ASAP."

"People in wheelchairs cannot get around town easily. They cannot get up the hills, cross the roads or even wheel properly due to the uneven surfaces."


